Remembering

While working on the PET archives this summer, I found a treasure chest full of stories of hope. Since receiving a PET, thousands of mobility impaired individuals have found hope *and* a new lease on life. These archived stories revealed Larry and Laura Hills' three-fold dream involving hand-cranked carts (see page 2):

1. to provide PET carts to those outside the U.S. in need of mobility because of illness, disease, birth defects, or landmines.
2. to provide meaningful volunteer work for senior citizens.
3. to develop a training center for those who wanted to start new affiliate shops across the United States.

This issue of Mobility Worldwide, Penney Farms, Florida, highlights how each of these goals have been met.

CELEBRATING MEANINGFUL WORK

Once a month, volunteers, mostly retired folks, who are involved in producing PET carts, meet for lunch in the dining room at Penney Retirement Community. It's a time to learn about recent Mobility Worldwide happenings and get better acquainted with each other.

Hearty laughter and pleasant conversation flow among the workers. Dessert and coffee signal a transition to business as Administrative Coordinator Barbara Chase begins her informative remarks.

Photos with stories of recipients are passed around; the volunteers hear about interaction with groups who are working with us; news and concerns about others may be shared; board news is reviewed.

Dave Quirk, purchasing coordinator, gives encouraging reports. Most recently, he related that our goal to produce 800 carts in the last fiscal year was met—and exceeded by 101 carts! He figured an average of 15.5 hours went into producing one cart, based on 13,965 total volunteer hours over 11 months.

As pleased as everyone is at successfully building carts, where they go and whom they impact

provides the motivation to keep on producing more. Dave reported that 400 carts were shipped out from Penney Farms in August. Carts going to Honduras numbered 160; the rest went to other parts of Central and South America. The shipping this time was handled by MedShare in Georgia and Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach in Springfield, Illinois. In September, 181 more went to Thailand.

Mobility Worldwide International and its affiliates have shipped carts to 104 countries. Penney Farms has sent carts to 47 of these countries.

Much is being accomplished for the mobility impaired in developing countries, and volunteers at Penney Farms rejoice that they are a part of this effort. The sense of unity, of pulling together to meet a common goal, is extremely gratifying.

THE BEGINNING OF PETS

Enjoy the following story gleaned from Mobility Worldwide's Penney Farms archives. It was a pivotal event for the development of Personal Energy Transportation carts in 1995 by Larry Hills and Mel West, co-founders, and Earl Minor, designer/engineer. Mama Kazeme's "cart" was the precursor to the carts we know today.

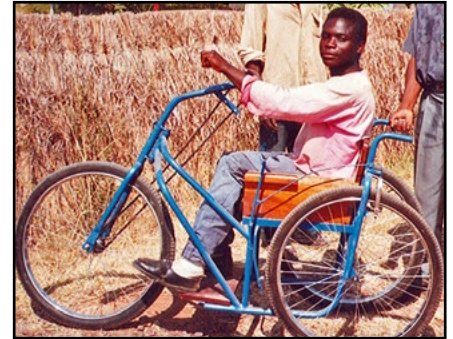
Excerpts from a 2002 speech by Larry Hills

After my wife Laura and I completed 23 years as missionaries in Zambia, we were reassigned to the area around Lake Mweru in Zaire. One day I was wading through the 12-foot-high elephant grass when, to my surprise, I almost stepped on the head of a woman! She was sliding on her stomach in the grass, soaking wet from the morning dew. On her back rode a baby, a few months old. Two other children followed behind, about three and five years old.

Recovering from our mutual surprise, she introduced herself as Mama Kazeme. She explained polio had left her crippled at age 12. Did I know where she could get a hand-pedaled tricycle to help her get up out of the dirt?

She explained her husband, a Christian, had recently died and neither her family nor his were willing to aid her. She needed the tricycle to help care for her family. I told her we had them and asked her to wait where she was until I could return.

Thankfully, we had just received two. The tricycles were made with bicycle wheels appropriate for city streets, not rough country paths. When they broke, welding was required but was not readily available. I knew the tricycle would help, but it was not enough.

Larry Hills' personal belief that "no one is entitled to luxuries so long as anyone lacks necessities," reflects why he's devoted these many years to the development and promotion of PETs. He challenges everyone to multiply efforts until each person who needs a mobility cart has one.

THE HILLS' DREAM OF DEVELOPING AFFILIATES

The PET Project at Penney Farms, Florida, started in 2001: First in Larry Hills' garage, then in a corner area of a rented auto repair shop and, in 2008, on the campus of Penney Retirement Community (PRC) in a large, new warehouse.

Very soon after starting in 2001, a visitor of a PRC resident was introduced to the shop and immediately asked to be trained to open a shop in Luling, Texas. This marked the beginning of Larry and Laura Hills' ministry of training others to set up shops.

By 2004 there were five shops: Columbia, MO; Penney Farms, FL; Luling, TX; Tampa, FL; and Southwest, MO. It became evident that some kind of umbrella organization was needed because the Hills were spending their days at the Penney Farms shop

and evenings communicating with the developing shops.

In 2004, five directors of the existing shops and others, gathered to form an incorporated organization. Their goal was to establish standards, assist with transportation and distribution of carts, and help purchase materials more economically. They divided up the many organizational tasks and in 2005 PET International, Inc. was formed!

When Larry and Laura retired in 2010, they traveled the U.S. to visit more than 20 affiliates and to help establish more sites. Several years later, after many fruitful years of seeing their dream being realized, they "retired" again—but continue to tell the story, inspiring many to become faithful participants.
