In the last several weeks, pictures and stories have been coming from *The Luke Commission*'s staff member, Janet Tuinstra, in Swaziland, Africa. As *The Luke Commission* takes it's mobile medical clinic on the road 3 times each week, they take with them PET carts to be given to people who qualify for them. These people must be able to pedal the carts, and also be incapable of walking more than short distances. The carts are adjusted to fit each rider, and then these folks are given instructions in how to best drive, park, and care for these incredible mobility devices.

Then love **Meli**, a precious 15 yr. old boy, through his mother's story "PET Better Than Food." Their stories will grab your heart!

"Oh, if I could have ..."

"Oh, if I could have one of those..." said Ntombikayise, glancing longingly at a PET cart being assembled at a Luke Commission outreach.

"I came today, because I have a rash on my body. That's why I want to see the doctor, but look at that cart...."

Ntombikayise Noma Matsenjwa could not walk. She was born with club feet that were never corrected, although they could have been fixed if Ntombikayise's family had money, or been closer to medical care.

She crawled on her hands and knees. Her father bought her soccer shin guards in Johannesburg to protect her knees, and she wore shoes on her hands. She seldom saw her father—he lived in South Africa.

Ntombikayise lived close to the school where TLC's mobile hospital was being held that day. "I was up early, early this morning to be one of the first people here," she said.

How did she get there? On her hands and knees, of course. Was this her first TLC outreach? Yes.

Dr. Harry treated her rash and ordered an x-ray to test for tuberculosis. It was negative. TLC gave her a pair of leather gloves for her hands to replace the worn shoes she used on her hands.

Not married, but the mother of a 16-year-old boy, Ntombikayise shared a homestead with a brother and his three children, and a sister and her two children.

How did Ntombikayise get food and necessities? She shook her head slightly, looked down, and answered: "I buy and sell Nik-Naks (small bags of chips)." But that was for another day, another time.

This day, Ntombikayise received her PET and learned how to drive it. "Watch me!" she said, as she pedaled the cart with her strong arms and hands.

When she left the outreach, it was with a grin and a wave, as she called back "I will go everywhere now!"

"PET Better than Food" a Mother Says

Her boy needed help. She needed help. Meli's mother had heard The Luke Commission was coming to a school close by her rural community in Swaziland, southern Africa.

Khanyisile Dlamini would walk with her 15-year-old son Meli on her back. He was small for someone that age, but Khanyisile was petite too. Her precious load was heavy.

"I heard about a special cart from America that The Luke Commission gives," she said later.

Meli was healthy when he was born. But at age 5, he became ill with an infection that apparently caused brain damage. "After it happened," Khanyisile explained, "he could no longer walk or talk."

Fortunately, Meli was still able to sit up and use his arms and hands. But his mother was never able to get him a wheelchair.

When Simon, assembled the PET, mother and son watched. "Thank you very much. Thank you to the people in America for making this for my boy. Now life will be good for him."

Khanyisile is not married, although she has three other children. Her parents used to assist in the care of her children, but they have died. Meli has never gone to school.

How does Khanyisile feed and clothe her children? She shrugged, when TLC's staff member translated this question into SiSwati. "Anyone willing to help, even my brothers, do." Then she smiled, "But this cart is better than food."

After being instructed how to care for her boy's PET cart, how to engage and to release the brake, she began to teach her son. They left to go home—<u>next</u> to each other this time—<u>she walked</u>, <u>Meli rode</u>.
