

A Ministry to the World from Northwest Indiana



Mbingwa Village, Malawi—They were already waiting when the 3 members from the U.S.'s *Malawi Project* arrived at a school near their village. Dick Stephens, Jim Messenger, and Dan Brewer arrived in Malawi one day earlier, just in time for them to join Wilson Tembo of *Action for Progress* for a cluster of Mobility Cart distributions in Mbingwa Village.

The 14 who had been screened and were eligible to receive mobility units stood out in the gathered crowd—they were the ones who had crawled, or were carried there. It was a moment of awe and emotion for the U.S. team. No matter how many times you see it, there is still that extreme disconnect between our reality and their reality—stepping out of a country of such affluence as the U.S. and seeing this reality! Each recipient is usually in extreme poverty, with no way to contribute to the welfare of their families or village. With no way to move about, they have no hope and no future. It is impossible to know what this moment means to each of the fourteen. Their lives are about to change. No more crawling in the mud during heavy rains, no more entering outside toilets on their hands and knees, and no more confinement to their tiny village huts because no one is strong enough to lift and transport them from one place to another. Now they can move about, become productive, go to church services, go to school, visit the market, attend a soccer game, start a business, go outside with their children and grandchildren.

After speeches were extended from several dignitaries who attended, including tribal authority and an official from the central government, the moment came. The first name was called, and that person crawled out of the crowd and over to the first mobility unit in the line of 14. The next name, the next, and the next — one by one until there were 14 smiling people sitting atop the sturdy new units. Color seemed to swish around the courtyard as all of them started tentatively moving about, trying a turn,

backing up, then circling all around in excitement! It was like the best ever birthday present, or perhaps like an unimaginable Christmas celebration! No wonder—their lives had just changed. As long as they possessed these mobility units, everything would be different!

Climbing the Big Mountain

Mulanje, Malawi — Near the border of Malawi and Mozambique is a 9,849 foot high formidable mountain known as Mulanje Massif that

protrudes much higher than any of the surrounding terrain—it is not far from where 60-year-old Bisket Mashuwana lives. Bisket had a mountain of this proportion in his life—he was severely physically challenged—his mountain had been insurmountable for all 60 years of his life!

Bisket recalled how his parents had told him when he was other children. But when it was time to start walking, it insufficient strength to walk or stand. Now, that has all changed since someone took action to help him.

Yusuf Mataka, a minister living in the area, learned of Bisket and his story. It plagued him and he could not get Bisket off his mind, so Yusef contacted *Action for Progress*, the program he knew was helping many people by providing them with mobility assistance. Yusef took *Action for Progress* representatives to meet Bisket and others who needed help with their "mobility mountains."

"It's like a dream" he voiced after receiving a blue and green mobility unit. "I have never received such a gift since my birth, 60 years ago!"

Unlike Mulanje, the massive mountain that continues to stand tall, challenging, and imposing, the "mountain" in Bisket's life has been cut down to size. It is now more manageable — the opportunity to overcome it had arrived in the form of a mobility unit from Mobility Ministries, in Indiana.

Chiyenda Chikuti, a relative of Bisket, expressed his profound gratitude for the unit: "We have struggled for years to get access to mobility for Bisket from other people. They came with their promises but when they left, so did their promises. But not this time. Yusuf Mataka visited us and made a promise. After just a few days we now sing a joyful song. Mobility Ministries is Affected by Current Economic Uncertainties

1. How has the **economy** changed the dynamics of this ministry?

This ministry depends heavily on purchasing parts and supplies to build Carts. The cost of wheels, seats, front forks, wood, welding supplies and paint has all increased considerably. We now invest about \$375 to \$400 in each Cart we build and ship—this is up from the \$300 we were working with for a number of years.

2. Have supply and demand issues affected this ministry?

Yes; at one point we were without wheels for 4-1/2 months; and then the sprocket supply became a problem. We are now ordering parts and materials much further ahead to be sure we do not run short; this also puts pressure on the finances. But we are blessed that our shipping costs have not changed over the last several years.

3. Are we encouraging our supporters to **increase their support**?

God has blessed us richly so far, and we believe that will continue. We continue to faithfully inform you of the purpose of this ministry, its need for your prayers, and its need for your financial support; but it is God who moves people to respond to these needs.

Much of our financial support comes between Thanksgiving and Christmas because we are reminded of Jesus's gift for us. Jesus instructed us to love Him for what he has done for us, and to show that Love to the world, by loving our "neighbors." We are one of those ministries that can assist you in expressing your love for the needlest men, women and children that we serve around the world—the physically challenged! We provide the dual gifts of *Mobility* and *Dignity*, in Christ's name! So we are thankful for your past and present support! We respectfully request that you faithfully continue to support this ministry—it has an <u>unlimited</u> number of "neighbors" that <u>need</u> assistance!
